Allan A. Ryan is a graduate of Dartmouth College and the University of Minnesota Law School, magna cum laude. He was a law clerk for Justice Byron R. White of the United States Supreme Court, and a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps. From 1980 to 1983 he was the Director of the Office of Special Investigations, U.S. Department of Justice, the chief Nazi war crimes prosecutor for the United States.

In 1995-96, he was an adviser on genocide prosecutions to the Government of Rwanda, and a consultant to the Lawyers Committee for Human Rights (now Human Rights First) on issues related to the International Criminal Court treaty. Since 1990 has taught human rights and the law of war at Boston College Law School. He is a member of the International Association of Genocide Scholars. From 1985 to 2001 he was University Attorney, Office of the General Counsel, Harvard University; he is now Director of Intellectual Property, Harvard Business School Publishing.

He is the author of Quiet Neighbors: Prosecuting Nazi War Criminals in America and Klaus Barbie and the United States Government: A Report to the Attorney General of the United States. His most recent publication is *Sharpening the Cutting Edge of International Human Rights Law: Nuremberg's Contributions to International Law,* 30 Boston College Comp. and Int. Law Review 55 (Winter 2007). He is currently writing Yamashita's Ghost: Our Enemies, Our Law and the Accountability of Command (University of Kansas Press, forthcoming).
